Rector's Reflection

Today we are celebrating All Saints Sunday. The festival of All Saints took place on the 1st of November. How many people in the western world knew or celebrated All Saints, or All Hallows to give it its old name. There were no parties, no dressing up no looking for sweeties, and the retail industry made no money out of the feast of All Saints. Yet on the eve of All Saints, properly called All Hallows Even, all of the above took place. "Why," I ask myself, "do we glorify evil and give so much importance to all that is unholy?" Counter this to the fact that those who are righteous and sanctified by the blood of the lamb pass by without any mention.

Halloween is only a small symptom of the evil that we glorify and allow freedom in our midst. Just think about it. Halloween is all about decay and putrefaction, ugliness in form and devoid of light declaring only darkness. Deep darkness of the soul and the grave.
